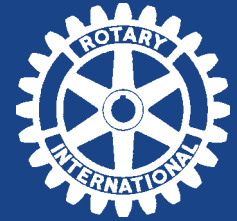

Governor's Message All Because of Rotary Part 2

The path to being a district governor starts with planning several events. The District Governor Elect (DGE) is given many responsibilities, including planning and executing the Grants/Foundation Seminar in October; attending a full week of Zone meetings requiring air travel; preparing to travel to San Diego for the International Assembly and be trained by Rotary International on all aspects of being a governor; planning and executing our *Presidents Elect Training Seminar* (PETS 1); being responsible for the *Multi District PETS* in March, *District Assembly* in May, and *Changing of the Guard* in June; and attending the *International Conference*, which for me was in Seoul, Korea. These events are all the responsibility of the DGE. You might think it's the responsibility of the sitting Governor since it happens during his/her year, but it's not. It's a whirlwind year and many tasks are sprung on you; it's daunting but rewarding.

Now that I have started as District Governor, it's time to execute my vision and motivate YOU to be part of this year, **ALL BECAUSE OF ROTARY.**

I briefly touched on my vision of *Growth Through Fellowship* in last month's Governor's Message. It's my belief we can learn from each other and work together to grow our clubs and morale. So when I planned PETS 1, I included a game to get the Presidents Elect (PE) to mix, mingle and meet each other. I took a playing card, cut it in half and gave one half to each PE as they arrived for PETS 1. Each person had to search among the others to see what card each had. When they found their match, I asked them to sit together during dinner. I explained that I would like the two clubs to work on a joint project. It could be an existing project that they mutually agreed to or it could be a completely new project of their choice. I called it the *Card Swap Fellowship* -hopefully your President has already talked about it at one of your meetings, told you which club is your match, and maybe you're already working on it. Several clubs have told me they have their project and are well on the way!

I asked the PEs to complete the joint projects by March 1, 2017, with a view to having the two clubs create a storyboard of the project for display at the District Conference, May 5-7, 2017...check out the conference at www.sweettobe2016.com. I believe *we can turn a member of a Rotary Club into a Rotarian by attending District Conference.* We are offering a "rookie" discount for first time attendees. Encourage your new members to attend; for those of us seasoned Rotarians, it's time to come back and join us at Shawnee on the Delaware.

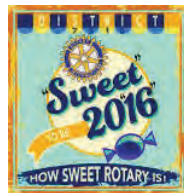

In a three-tier program, RLI provides those so identified with a quality education in Rotary knowledge and leadership skills so important in voluntary organizations. Upon completion of the first three levels, a graduate course is available.

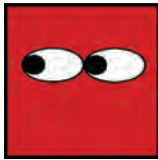
