Marsha now joins nine District 7510 Rotarians who, beginning in 2009, have also been so honored. They are: Marcia Bossart, Nick Carnevale, Yeddi Dennis, Bill Henderson, Tulsi Maharjan, Suresh Patel, Augustine Pushparaj, Cheruvasseri Ravindranth, and most recently Edna Stout, creator of EarlyAct.

Marsha was born in Madison, Wisconsin—the daughter *and* granddaughter of Rotarians. She later served as a Corpsman in the United States Navy, and went on to a career in advertising and marketing. A highly accomplished pianist and teacher, she has performed at many All-Faiths Services at District Conferences, among other venues. Marsha's level of commitment as a Rotarian and other avenues of service goes supremely beyond the pale of the ordinary.

After having served as President of the Mountainside Rotary Club, Marsha went on to become District Governor in 2002-03 (she is one of just five women to have served in this capacity in the District's 96-year history). Later, she served as District Trainer for four years. She has also chaired or co-chaired a huge number of important district-level committees, including Annual Giving, four District Conferences, Group Study Exchange, Long-Range Planning, Care & Share, PolioPlus, Membership, Public Relations, Gift of Hope, Project Literacy, and the balance of this list is close to endless!

Beyond Rotary, Marsha is Past President of the Junior Women's Club of Plainfield and the NJ Pop Warner League, and is Past State Chair for Al-Anon, among much, much more.

My Trip to the Birthplace of Rotary

I did plan ahead and make reservations for the tour, and was rewarded with a great time (more on that later).

During lunch one day, I had the pleasure of visiting the local 'Westmont Rotary Club'. This club meets every Tuesday at Vincitori Restaurant, Westmont. The president of the club, Irv Kaplan, and their board members welcomed me wholeheartedly to their club. During the meeting, we exchanged our service programs and fundraising events. The club also viewed and discussed their experiences on "The Boys of 1905 - A History of Rotary International." Before leaving, the club honored me with their customized club pin. It was really a great experience for me to visit extended Rotary family and share views and learn new things from them.

On Friday, February 12, I visited the Rotary International (RI) world headquarters at 1560 Sherman Ave, Evanston, IL. The reservation was made two weeks ahead for free, 30-minute tour. You will receive confirmation by email as soon as you are finished with the registration.



During the tour, I had the thrill of visiting and taking photos of the ground floor 'End Polio Now' exhibition and world update; Room 711, a reproduction of the site of the first Rotary club's meeting; the new Arch Klumph Society Gallery, featuring glass lithographs of major contributors to The Rotary Foundation; the Rotary International boardroom; and the offices of Rotary's senior leaders.

During my visit, the RI President, President-elect and President-nominee were in the tours! I had the opportunity to visit each of their offices and see, in detail, their collections, books and portraits etc. The President's office offered a flag 'Be a Gift to the World' and pin. The tour staff was very cordial, patient and cooperative in each and every detail.

I personally recommend that every Rotarian visit the Rotary International World Headquarters. You will have an amazing experience of what our Rotary is offering to the entire world with selfless 'SERVICE ABOVE SELF.' It is a true reflection of how we can all 'Be a Gift to the World.'



2016 honoree. I'm hoping to have a tough decision to make—and it's up to each club to make this decision as difficult for me as you possibly can!

Now you may think this message is aimed at our current Club Presidents and you'd be correct...but not entirely, because it's really up to every Rotarian to make certain his or her club is as vital and vibrant as you can personally make it!

Your club's been "flying" for the past seven months. Now it's time to aim your Rotary "plane" at the downwind leg, because you'll very soon be turning onto your base leg and then your final approach to touchdown in just a few short months.

The deadline will be the end of April, because the presentation will be made at the District Conference in mid-May. So let's get started...

Check out the criteria for Rotary International's [Presidential Citation](#) for Rotary Clubs and the Interact and Rotaract Clubs you may sponsor (If you don't have a copy, just use any Internet search engine for "2016 rotary presidential citation"). The criteria below are key, but I haven't listed them all. Compare your club's planned achievements against these. You don't necessarily have to have completed every one shown here; this is so you can get a sense for what it may take to be a high-achieving club.

- Have you set at least 15 goals in [Rotary Club Central](#)?
- Did your club pay your [club invoice](#) of last July on time?
- Will you have a net membership gain of at least one (<50 member clubs) or two (50+ member clubs)? Are these men or women?
- Will you maintain 100% retention or, if less than 100%, improve retention by 1%?
- How about service projects? (Not fund-raisers; not check-writing exercises—actual hands-on projects.) Have at least three-quarters of your club members participated in one or more that you've listed at [Rotary Club Central](#)?
- Is your club supporting The Rotary Foundation?
- Are you growing your number of [Paul Harris Fellows](#)?
- Have at least half your members signed up with [My Rotary](#)?
- Have you posted a club service project on [Rotary Showcase](#)?
- Have two or more club members participated in [discussion groups](#)?
- Have one or more members joined a [Rotarian Action Group](#)?
- Did you send a member to our Foundation & Grants workshop?
- Has your club partnered with five or more other Rotary clubs on a project, and listed it at [Rotary Club Central](#)?
- Do you sponsor or co-sponsor an Interact Club or Rotaract Club?
- Have three or more of your members mentored an Interactor or Rotaractor?
- What about "public image"? Have you used Rotary's new visual identity guidelines (available at the [Brand Center](#)) to update your club's website, social media pages, club brochure, and newsletter?

Yes, some of this will be challenging, but some of it's no-brainer stuff too. If your club qualifies for this year's Presidential Citation, you're sure to make the short list for Outstanding Club of the Year. But, even if you don't hit all the goals, you could still be in the running! So check out the full criteria and GO FOR IT!

World Peace Conference Part 2 DG Hal Daumé

I didn't mention Sharon Stone in my first article about the Rotary World Peace Conference that Linda and I were so honored to attend because, at the time, I didn't have a good photo. Now I do, thanks to the Rotary.org website, and I'd like to share it with you.

More than a mere actor reciting her lines, Sharon Stone is a legendary humanitarian and a very real and unprepossessing person. Yes, we all know her from such blockbusters as "Total Recall," "Basic Instinct," and "Casino," and we know she's received both a Golden Globe Award and an Emmy. But you probably didn't know she was born and raised in a small Pennsylvania town and later lived in New Jersey for some years as well.

You also may not know that, in 2001, she was felled by a brain aneurysm and subsequent cerebral hemorrhage that lasted nine days. She's since recovered,



but not 100 percent. It was visible on the stage the evening we saw and heard her speak (Linda and I agreed she still looks fabulous, by the way). At times, she'd simply stop mid-thought...long pause...then her brain would sort of hit a "reset" button and she'd continue with her speech--which was much more like a conversation, and without flair or forgery, without glitz or Hollywood glamor.

Ms. Stone urged us--all 1,500 of us--to find tolerance within ourselves as a way to develop compassion and understanding for others. Noting that today's technology makes it easy to learn about diverse cultures and beliefs, she encouraged us to embrace differences while learning about others' work. As for those who would stop us or our work for humanity, she stated, "The more we understand the darkness of our enemies, the better we know what to do, how to respond and behave."

That night, as we are gifts to the world, she was a gift to us.
