

## Governor's Message - August is for Membership

August is *Membership and New Club Development Month*, which means it's time to celebrate your Rotary club, your members, and the good you do in your community and around the world.

As you contemplate the many ways to join the celebrations, please be reminded of several of the goals included in the PRESIDENTIAL CITATION for 2017-2018:

- Achieve a net gain in membership.
- Achieve a net gain in female membership.
- Achieve a net gain in members under age 40.

As Governor, I am setting the bar much higher for 2017-2018, calling on all clubs to double their membership this year with some additional conditions.

- First, all clubs should set the goal to have at least 30 members. Right now, that includes my own club.
- If your club is larger, strive to reach 100!! The Scotch Plains-Fanwood Rotary, under the leadership of Lt. Governor Steve Goldberg, announced its plan to get into triple-digit membership this Rotary year. Steve dares all the other larger clubs to do the same!

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Don't forget, the District 7510 Bylaws include a provision for the waiver of district dues for those members under 30 years of age, which only applies if the club also waives their club dues. My hope is that this bylaw change prompts clubs to bring in young members - the future of Rotary.

And it is already paying off! In August, I already attended the induction ceremony of five Rotaractors into membership in the Branchburg club! So let's see more of that.

But it is not just about strengthening your club's membership. It is also about expanding Rotary's footprint to every community in our district. That's because every community without a Rotary club contributes to our loss of image and relevance. And as our image declines, the value of being part of Rotary declines. That is not a path I wish to continue.

In this regard, District Membership Chair Bill Graham and Assistant Governor Art Lobdell have been working with multiple parties to expand Rotary's footprint. Green shoots are already sprouting, including a Satellite Club in Linden sponsored by Art's club, the Rotary Club of Elizabeth. Bill is working with the Union County Chamber of Commerce to promote Rotary in other

### Global Grant Awarded

The Rotary Club of Branchburg has been approved for a grant for micro-credit loans to businesses and farmers in Nepal. After the recent earthquake, many people lost their livelihoods. Businesses need additional capital to expand and grow services in the local community.

The total grant is for \$91,000. Branchburg is putting in \$14,000; assisted by the Rotary Club of Montgomery- Rocky Hill for \$1,000; our District 7510 is matching with \$15,500 of DDF, and Rotary International is matching with \$38,500. The remaining \$22,000 was raised by the local clubs and districts in Nepal. .

This is a wonderful example of how Rotarians around the world work together to benefit those in need. Congratulations and kudos to the Branchburg club.

### "Dare to be great!" - Update

Last month our District's "Club Activity of the Month" was an appeal by Interactors of Middlesex County Academy and a challenge to "Dare to be Great!" The Interactors announced an initiative to mobilize the youth of the world to carry our one of the biggest humanitarian projects in history; namely a month-long read-a-thon to improve reading proficiency everywhere. This read-a-thon

will, at the same time, raise money to enable millions of the world's poorest children to survive, attend school and also learn to read.

As part of their initiative, the Interactors created a video on YouTube and posted it to Facebook. Since it was posted, the number of followers has doubled every week. Rotaractors and Interactors from more than 45 countries representing more than half the population of the entire planet have responded positively.

Even more exciting is that Rotaractors, Interactors and some Rotarians have volunteered to advocate for the initiative in all Rotaract and Interact clubs in their respective countries. In fact, these volunteers have already formed a *Rotary Youth World Council* to coordinate the efforts in all participating countries around the world

Given that there are some 30,000 Rotaract and Interact clubs in the world and all the activity to date is the result of posting on the Facebook Timelines of only 120 of them (and around 10 individuals), the potential for growth is immense. As the country coordinators kick in with their teams, we can expect a huge increase in the number of fans and supporters.

This "Dare to be Great" initiative is one of the District Strategic Projects for this year. 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## Polio Report.....Bill Mealia, Co-Chair

The positive news on polio at the District level is that we exceeded our District \$20,000 goal, raising \$74,274.00!! Of this total, District Governor Minton authorized \$50,016.00 from un-used District dedicated funds from the Rotary Foundation.

Another very positive aspect of the giving is that sixteen clubs gave \$1,000.00 or better, with a total of twenty-three clubs donating money (59% of our clubs gave).

Unfortunately, 41% gave nothing, which is very disappointing.

But more good news - the Gates Foundation has extended their matching program, so our \$74,274 becomes \$222,822 with the Gates Foundation match!

Let it be known to the children of the world that we are winning the battle against the polio virus.


